

Fund participation in the "kNOwVAWdata Course on the Measurement of Violence against Women"

BACKGROUND

Globally, violence against women is an urgent public health, human rights, economic and public policy priority. Reliable, comparable data on violence against women are essential to prevention and response efforts, however technical capacity to collect data about violence against women safely and accurately is limited.

OPPORTUNITY TO SPONSOR THE NEXT GENERATION OF VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN DATA COLLECTORS

Sponsors have a unique opportunity to contribute to the collection of life-saving data on the prevalence of violence against women in countries throughout Asia and the Pacific.

kNOwVAWdata's landmark Course on the Measurement of Violence against Women hones the data literacy skills of practitioners, researchers, government representatives and others to measure violence against women reliably, ethically and comparably. With sponsors' support, course participants will join a growing pool of violence against women data experts who are working to advance Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) 5 for gender equality.

WHY SPONSOR?

To ensure effective action to reduce violence against women, it is important to include local professionals in the process—but many do not have sufficient budget for capacity development of this kind. Measuring violence against women needs to be done sensitively so local governments trust, value and use the data. By helping countries develop the skills and tools needed to collect and analyse their own data, sponsors enable and empower countries' long-term capacity to monitor progress towards SDG 5 without reliance on external consultants.

The kNOwVAWdata course works to sustainably build the capacity of countries to measure the prevalence of violence against women so sound data is available across Asia and the Pacific initially, and eventually globally.

ABOUT THE COURSE

Launched in 2018, the annual 4-week kNOwVAWdata course is held in two 2-week blocks. It is for professionals who are currently or will soon be involved in carrying out violence against women prevalence surveys in their countries, and those who seek to build their skills in measuring the prevalence of violence against women. Completion of the full course will lead to a certificate of professional development from the University of Melbourne. Some blocks of the 2020 course will be eligible for credit towards a University of Melbourne degree if participants enrol for a higher degree.

ABOUT kNOwVAWdata

The kNOwVAWdata course is a partnership between the Asia and the Pacific Regional Office of the United Nations sexual and reproductive health agency (UNFPA), the Australian Government Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT), the University of Melbourne, and Australia's National Research Organisation for Women's Safety (ANROWS).

The kNOwVAWdata initiative improves the availability and quality of data to inform more effective policy and programme responses to prevent and end violence against women across Asia and the Pacific.
